### NEW COUNCIL ELECTED

May saw the election of the new Woodchester Parish Council. Seven individuals stood for the seven seats and were thus elected uncontested. Of those elected, four were existing councillors standing for re-election. The council welcomed its new members Penny Brown, Peter Lead and Paul Syrett and was pleased to note a doubling of the number of women on the council. ### LITTER PICK 2008

Woodchester village held its annual litter pick in April. Around 30 residents turned out on what was mostly a sunny afternoon to collect rubbish from roadsides and along the cycle trail. The

afternoon's pickings varied from bottles and cans to a bicycle. In total around 20 giant bags of litter were collected for disposal by Stroud District Council.

## VILLAGE HALL NEWS

### HEARING LOOP/AUDIO SYSTEM

The quotation for the above system has come in at £5,000, which includes personnel training. We have pleasure in announcing that the sum of £500 has been received from Age Concern towards the cost, which brings our total fundraising so far to £1,900 (£500 Age Concern plus £1,400 from Villagers). Whilst we are trying to raise funds from other public sources, we are still appealing for private donations, or if possible from public-spirited people to do fundraising events within the village. Your help is needed for this very useful and worthy cause.

### VILLAGE HALL RENTS

The cost of gas/electricity/water and other maintenance services has risen considerably during the past few years, therefore it is with regret that the Trustee Management Committee has found it necessary to raise the rent for Village Hall regular courses by 50p to £5.50 per hour as from the 1st September 2008. The hourly rate for occasional bookings stays at £9 per hour and will be reviewed at the next Annual General Meeting in April 2009. These charges include heating, lighting and the use of the kitchen.

### VILLAGE HALL COURSES

Details of the various ongoing activities are published on all the Village Notice Boards and on the telegraph pole outside the Village Hall. There is a vacant bi-monthly Tuesday afternoon, which would be ideal for anyone interested in running a discussion group or general get-together with perhaps the offer of afternoon tea. ### TABLE TENNIS IN WOODCHESTER

With the demise of the youth club at the end of the 1960s, young villagers from the cricket club set up a table tennis section which played firstly at South Woodchester Hall. Tony, Martin and David Bourne, Vic Murray, Tony Vick, Geoff Russell, Mike Hanks (whose father still lives in Woodchester) and John Higgins to name but a few. After several years in exile at Farmhill cricket pavilion, the table tennis club returned to Woodchester to play in the Village Hall. Employment elsewhere and the cost of housing in Woodchester depleted the original membership, with Mike Hanks being the only survivor. Workmates were introduced to the club, and players now come from Stroud, Gloucester and even Cheltenham. The vastly improved facilities at the Village Hall have helped in getting good players to join the club, which in return provides the largest income from users of the hall. Our thanks go to Bob Ludlow, the Village Hall Chairman, for his tireless work in getting funding for the Hall modernisation. For the season just ended, Woodchester A and B sides finished 1st and 2nd in Division 1 of the Stroud League. Four teams play at the hall on Tuesday and Friday evenings from September to March. No club night as such exists. With new tournament tables costing £500 plus, care has to be taken in their use.

Committee member John Smith co-ordinates table tennis use of the Village Hall, and can be contacted on 01453 766116. Most of the participants in table tennis today are veterans,

so age is not a bar to playing. Interested villagers who could perhaps make up an additional team (minimum 3 members) in due course should contact John. You might even persuade him to run a few sessions for practice and start a local revival.
