Return of replica mosaic in doubt

Plans to bring the famous replica of the Woodchester Orpheus Mosaic back to the area are in doubt in spite of the best efforts of a community team to negotiate its return.

The original Great Orpheus Pavement was made in 325AD by craftsmen from the Corinium School of Mosaicists in Cirencester and was the floor in the main reception room of the magnificent Roman villa at Woodchester. This was one of the largest villas in Roman Britain, boasting more than 64 rooms and thirteen mosaics of which the Orpheus Pavement was the largest and most intricate. First uncovered in 1793 by Samuel Lysons, The Great Orpheus Pavement is considered to be the finest Roman mosaic floor in Britain, and the largest and most complicated yet discovered in Northern Europe. Historians have called it "one of Britain's greatest historical treasures", and it is of international significance.

It was last uncovered in 1973, when 140,000 people visited Woodchester to see the mosaic in just 7 weeks. Following the last uncovering of the pavement, a full-size replica was made by local builders Bob and John Woodward. It took them ten years to construct, using 12 tons of clay, 1.6 million tesserae, and measures 14.5 metres square, the same as the original mosaic. Experts at The British Museum have described the replica as "being of national importance, of great archaeological and historical significance and is a very important record of one the country's major antiquities".

After being displayed for some years at Prinknash Abbey, the replica was sold at auction in 2010 for £75,000 to a private collector and has not been seen since. Woodchester Parish Council were contacted recently by a BBC journalist with the news that the current owner may be prepared to loan the replica back to the community. It transpires that the replica was bought with the intention of installing it in a private villa in Italy, but the project was abandoned following the death of the owner's wife. The replica is now in storage near Heathrow Airport.

"We thought this was a real opportunity to get the replica back and put it on public display in the Woodchester area, and to retain this important historical artefact in the public domain for future generations" explains Woodchester resident Jim Searight, a member of the 'Orpheus Group' working on the project. The group is made up of three Woodchester residents, the Chairman of the Parish Council, the BBC journalist who set the project in motion, and Mark Woodward, son of one of the replicas creators. The Group has had extensive help and advice from Bob and John Woodward.

"We have inspected the replica in storage to confirm its condition and find out how much work is required to renovate it prior to display. The Group are in discussions with a number of local land owners as to a possible location for displaying the replica if we are successful in acquiring it, bearing in mind access issues" explains Jim.

Grit Bins

Please remember that the grit is provided for the whole community and should not be used on privately owned paths and driveways!


Grit and rock salt can be purchased from local garages and hardware stores, so please buy your own for private use. In the event of heavy snow, and should the County Council fail to turn up with a gritter and/or a snowplough, we have arranged for Peter Brown to bring his digger from the woodyard to clear Selsley Road on our behalf. Please help keep our village roads safe in the winter. Water Main Replacement from Westrip to Minchinhampton

Work is ongoing to replace the mains pipe from Westrip Minchinhampton. Severn Trent have begun work on Culver Hill before continuing through the village to Selsley. The map shows the proposed route of the water main work to be carried out by Severn Trent through Woodchester some time in the New Year. We have not been notified of the exact dates the work will start but will post these on the Parish Council website and notice-boards as soon as we have the necessary information. As the Parish Council are given more information relating to necessary road closures, details will be posted on notice boards, the village website and Facebook.

Road Closure - Selsley Road

The Parish Council have been informed that Selsley Road, from its junction with Church Lane down to the junction with Church Road, will be closed from the 21st December until the 28th December. The loop along Church Road, down past Southbank and back along Southfield Road will be open and will therefore experience an increase in traffic during this time. The official diversion however will be back down Selsley Hill to Sainsbury's and back along the A46. This is unrelated to the replacement water main.



Dates of Parish Council Meetings in 2019

New Road Safety Initiative launched

A new alliance to promote road safety in the Stroud area has been launched at a major conference in Stroud.

Representatives of more than 25 Town and Parish Councils in the Stroud District were joined by MP David Drew, Police and Crime Commissioner Martin Surl, and senior representatives of Gloucestershire Constabulary and Gloucestershire County Council Highways Department to discuss road safety in the Five Valleys.



As a result of that first meeting a Stroud District Road Safety Group has been set up, one of seven district groups planned for Gloucestershire, working together under a County Road Safety Alliance. "By working together as a group, the founders of

the new partnership hope that more councils will be able to implement measures which will make their roads safer" commented Iain Dunbar, a Woodchester Parish Councillor who has been appointed Chairman of the Stroud District Road Safety Group. "We are delighted with Police and Crime Commissioner Martin Surl's commitment to help us fund speed cameras in the Five Valleys. He made it clear that his officers will support our initiatives in a very positive way."

MP David Drew agreed that working together is the right approach. "We need to work together to get people to drive better and more slowly – an integrated approach is the way to get people to drive sensibly and to make our communities safer."

One objective of the new group will be to make it easier for local councils to implement more

appropriate speed limits in local towns and villages. "A traffic regulation order (TRO) is required to change a speed limit and this can cost in excess of £15,000 – a cost which is well out of the reach of smaller Parish Councils" explains Iain Dunbar. "We believe that there are many parishes who would like to implement lower speed limits in areas where there are road safety issue, and by working with GCC Highways department we hope to make it easier for these changes to happen."

This issue was raised in a House of Commons debate on Road Safety on 16 October by David Drew, who referred to the Whiteshill Meeting, complimented Rodborough and Whiteshill for their introduction of ANPR cameras, and asked the Minister to look at traffic regulation orders (TRO). "Can we have a way in which we can make villages more composite, so that each village does not have to pay quite a large sum of money to get a TRO to reduce the speed in their area to 20 mph, which is largely recognised as being what villages need."



The Stroud District Road Safety Group has already discussed some of the key issues concerning residents across the District, including the need in many areas to get more appropriate speed limits imposed, and then enforce those rigorously with new prevention and policing measures.

Following the major traffic survey undertaken by Woodchester Parish Council earlier this year, the priorities for Woodchester are a reduced speed limit within the village and on the A46 through the Parish.

However, they recently found out from the owner's agent that although a period of loan is possible, an outright purchase is required in the long term to seal the deal, and that the asking price is an eye-watering £550,000. The Orpheus Group have sought expert advice on the likely value of the replica, and the general consensus is that this valuation is somewhat high.

"We think the project is workable and that a suitable location can be found" commented local resident

Caroline Hill, another member of the Group, "but much as we would love to have it on display in the Woodchester area, the asking price is the stumbling block at this time. We are simply not prepared to pay over the odds and are currently trying to negotiate a more realistic price for the replica."

Much work has already gone into this project, and at the moment its success is hanging in the balance. Watch this space for more news......

World War 1

November 11th 2018 Remembrance Sunday – War Horse

The end of the First World War was marked by the service of remembrance at St. Mary's Church in North Woodchester, led by the Rev David Stoddart and Rev. Deborah Curran, and was proceeded by the act of remembrance and two minutes silence at the War Memorial where wreaths were laid on behalf of the church, British Legion and Parish Council.

An addition to those who attended this year was Val Woods' beautiful Shire Horse "Violet" adorned with poppies and "Remembering the War Horse" slung around her neck. Michael Morpurgo's famous and moving book of the story of the horses that were sent to the Western Front in their thousands and died there, and its film and stage play, are known to us all but having such a magnificent horse standing quietly while the two minutes silence took place was certainly a moving tribute to the sacrifice that the horses and their owners made.

To mark Remembrance Sunday on the 100th anniversary of the Armistice, the bells of St Mary's were rung half-muffled before the Service at 11 o'clock, to commemorate the men who died. Then at 12:30, to coincide with ringing all over the country, and with national parades, they were run "open" (without muffles) to celebrate the Peace. On Sunday 18th they were once more rung half-muffled for an individual serviceman who died exactly 100 years before, in a prisoner of war camp in Poland. After that there remains only one more serviceman to commemorate, who died as a result of his wounds, but not till 1920.

Lest We Forget

Several parishes in the Stroud and Nailsworth area are remembering the fallen of the Great War in their respective local magazines and newsletters, around the hundredth anniversary of their death. As Thomas Alfred Horwood was missed off last time, this is now the twelfth and penultimate article.

THOMAS ALFRED HORWOOD

Thomas Alfred Horwood was born 5 January 1896 in Woodchester, the son of James Goulding Horwood, a labourer, and his wife Emma Jane nee King. He was baptised on 17 October 1897 at All Saints Church, Selsley. In 1901, the family were living at Rubble Hole, Rodborough and by 1911, Thomas Alfred was a 15 year old assistant wood sawyer living with his widowed mother at the Alms Houses at the top of Bospin Lane. He was her only surviving child.

He enlisted as a Gunner in the Royal Garrison Artillery and went to Egypt on 8 July 1915. After that, his service is unclear but he must have returned to Europe as at some point he was taken prisoner. The medal roll suggests he was in 102nd Siege Battery and the Register of Soldiers' Effects suggests 26th Heavy Battery. Both of these were deployed in France.

As Alfred, he died of tuberculosis, aged 23, as a prisoner of war at Lazarett zu Czersk (Military Hospital), then in Prussia now in Poland, on 18 November 1918 and was buried locally. After the war, the bodies of Commonwealth service men were moved to Poznan and his resting place is in Poznan Old Garrison Cemetery.

It is possible that 'Alfred' had an earlier military career. A Thomas Horwood born c1894 Woodchester, enlisted in the 23rd Foot (Royal Welsh Fusiliers) on 27 October 1911. By May 1912, this man was already in trouble for being absent without leave, losing his equipment and stealing goods. In June 1912 the Army decided to dispense with his services - discharged for misconduct.

Cold Callers and the elderly

Woodchester Alms Houses

When he died in 1729, Richard Cambridge left £20 to the Overseers of the Poor of Woodchester. The interest was to be disposed of for the benefit of poor persons of the parish. In 1763, the then Overseers, Messrs Pavey, Box and Powell bought the Alms Houses for 16 guineas and spent the balance of the legacy in repairing them. Following the Local Government Act of 1894, the properties came under the power of the Parish Council and repairs as and when required were funded by subscription.

There were five houses and it was said many people were grateful for their shelter. However, their location left a lot to be desired – at the top of Bospin Lane! For many years there was no water supply and all water required had to be carried from the spring on the High Street. However, it was certainly not an 'unhealthy' place to live as many inhabitants lived there for over ten years and survived to a ripe old age.

As time went on, there was less need for the Alms Houses and for a while some stood empty. Finally, in 1954 the Charity Commissioners gave the Parish Council permission to sell them and in April the following year, they were sold for £125. After the deduction of costs, £107 14s 6d was invested and the yearly interest paid out to suitable recipients.

Over the years, the requirements changed from 'aged poor' to 'poor' but there were few calls on the funds and in 1997 the remainder was transferred to the Seys and Bridges Trust.

Huge thanks go to everyone who has donated and/or helped and contributed at our fund-raising events. There is still a way to go, so, if you can still contribute, please help us along the road. And we can now get on with starting the work!

The tendering process for our "Stage 1" (the new kitchen) has been taking place and four potential contractors have submitted their fixed price bids. This has taken longer than expected, first because of summer holidays and then because of their inprogress workload. Now we have to evaluate and pick a contractor, to start work as soon as can be done after Christmas. The church will remain in use while the work takes place, with a screened-off "building site" in the corner opposite the main door. Some of our weekday activities may need to be relocated away from the church but Sunday services, and any funerals, in a properly heated church, will continue to take place. We look forward to the mass production of hot-cross-buns in the new kitchen in time for Easter!


Community



Stroud Resilience Project at Boundary Court

Some people may have noticed recently that there have been contractors carrying out excavations on National Trust land at Boundary Court. These works have been approved by the National Trust and are in fact part of a much wider project being carried out by Severn Trent Water called The Stroud Resilience Project. By investing £11 million the project aims to install a new water pipeline from Whaddon near Gloucester through to Amberley, via sections of Boundary Court to make Stroud's drinking water supply even more resilient for the future.

The recent excavations across Boundary Court have been carried out by a team of archaeological contractors employed by Severn Trent to find out of there is any archaeological features before the water pipeline is installed. This is just one of 84 sites along the proposed route that are being investigated. The trenches have now been backfilled and the National Trust are happy with the quality of the works that were carried out.

It is not known exactly when the pipeline will be installed, but it is likely to be in the next 3 months. Again, the contractors have been employed by Severn Trent Water. It will cause disruption for local walkers for a time but it is hoped the pipeline will be installed as quickly as it can. Once the pipeline has been installed the disturbed areas will be sown with a native wildflower grass seed to ensure that Boundary Court is back to how it was before the works commence. We have had another successful year, and with the huge effort from Cathy and Pauline, we had a very successful shop refurbishment. A thank you also goes to all the villagers who bought our 2 year and 6 months bonds, as we wouldn't have been able to finance the refurbishment without them.

Financially, the shop refurbishment went without a hitch, as enough bonds could be sold to finance everything. We also already received the grant money from the Post Office, and the first half of the VAT refund, which gives us a current bank balance of £20,000.

We will see which part of the refurbishment can be written off this year as repairs, and which part we will have to write down over a longer period of time, which might even enable us to get a refund on last year's corporation tax. Our finances are in the usual healthy state, and there should be no issues repaying all the bonds in time.

The refurbishment went well even though we had some initial problems with humidity under the floor. We spent a bit more money on different flooring which copes better with the water, and our contractors still managed to bring the whole operation in on time, so that the shop could open on the Monday. New product lines were introduced as there is now more space on the shelves, and they have been well received by our customers.

The recent AGM thanked Cathy and Pauline for all their hard work organising and project managing the refurbishment. A lot of positive comments have been received from customers, and the whole project has been a huge success. The AGM decided on the usual 4% dividend per share, which will be paid out this month. An email will go out to all shareholders when the money is ready to be picked up at the Post Office. The AGM also decided to make the usual donations to Woodchester CoE Endowed Primary School, St. Mary's Primary School, Food Bank Stroud and the Village Hall.

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
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


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
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Gloucestershire Fire & Rescue Service Governance Review

In September Police and Crime Commissioner, Martin Surl, announced that he had taken the decision to reopen the work to assess the case for a change in the governance of Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS).

Work carried out by Office of the PCC (OPCC) has identified a number of clear benefits a change in governance could bring. They are all contained in an outline business case, now available on their website at https://www.gloucestershire-pcc.gov.uk/how-to-get-involved/consultations-and-surveys/. The next stage is to gather the views of people who live and work in Gloucestershire and this includes you. It is very important that as many people as possible take part in the consultation so please have a look at the outline business case and spare a few minutes to complete the short, anonymous, online survey.



There are four models of governance to consider. These are:

No change / status quo: This would mean Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service remains part of the County Council and collaboration continues to be progressed on a voluntary basis.

Representation: This is where the PCC would become a formal part of the existing governance for fire and rescue in GCC, with full voting rights.

Governance: Here the PCC takes on responsibility for Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service in much the same way he currently does for Gloucestershire Constabulary. The role would become the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner. Police and fire would retain their own chief officers and staff and be operationally independent of each another.

Single employer: This is where the PCC would take on responsibility for fire alongside the police and also appoint a single chief officer for both services. Front-line services would remain distinct but support services would be increasingly integrated.

Against a statutory test of critical factors (economy and efficiency, effectiveness, public safety) and an additional assessment of deliverability, analysis shows that the **Governance Model** would achieve the best outcomes for Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service and for Gloucestershire residents. This would mean that the PCC would become the **Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner**. Governance of GFRS would be very much the same as is it with the police. Neither the PCC nor the OPCC would be involved in any operational activity but there would be a requirement to develop a police and fire plan setting the strategic direction of the service as well as overseeing funding. Roles won't change either – police will stay police and fire will remain fire.
